

As they reflect upon their time at the school, many graduates appreciate the confidence they built along their journeys at BSS, and give generously so BSS girls can continue to forge their own paths through education.

Helping young women be leaders

As a student, Devon KIRK '01 took advantage of everything that BSS had to offer. Joining the school in Grade 7, she participated in soccer, volleyball, swimming, theatre and band. Off-campus extracurriculars were also highlights of her life at BSS: a Grade 8 exchange to Paris, France, where she lived with a family on their riverboat along the Seine; a trip to Bermuda with her field hockey team; and outdoor adventure trips with Physical Education teacher Ms. Fisher. "Looking back at my BSS education, what stands out for me is the breadth of experiences," says Kirk.

Kirk went on to earn a Bachelor of Commerce degree from McGill University, then a Juris Doctorate from Harvard Law School. After practising law in London, England, for two years, she returned to Canada and has worked for CPP Investment for the past nine years. She is now married and has a three-year-old daughter.

Today, Kirk stays connected to BSS as a donor and as a new member of the Board of Governors. She says both efforts are about giving back in different ways. "I have a lot of respect for the commitments teachers and staff make. I want to support their vision for the school, and ensure they have great resources to do that," says Kirk, adding that she sees the same high quality in the current teachers and staff as she recalls from her own time as a student.



Joining BSS governance has given her a new perspective on the school, and she feels even more aligned with our mission. "BSS is a welcoming environment that wants to see every community member thriving," she says. Kirk adds that she supports Financial Assistance because it widens opportunities for students who need it. "I'm most motivated by the idea of giving many young women access to an incredible education, to help them be leaders in the future."

Head Boarder embraces leadership and community

Grade 12 student Ana Maria G. is flying high as Head Boarder. This role requires Ana Maria, who has been a BSS student since Grade 9, to lead boarding council meetings and organize activities among her fellow boarders. "We help promote boarding spirit: we approach all grades and make sure they're all doing okay," says Ana Maria, listing dodgeball, friendly house competitions (she's in St. Monica's) and weekend activity days as some of the council's regular events.

She advanced her leadership skills as an Ambassador and the Global Awareness Head before becoming Head Boarder. "BSS offers you the opportunity to meet different groups and explore who you are as a leader," says Ana Maria. The Financial Assistance program at BSS provides support for exceptional students like Ana Maria, who take advantage of every opportunity the school offers.

Beyond her formal roles, Ana Maria also appreciates the informal aspects of BSS boarding life. "I really like being a boarder. It's this 24/7 community. We go to dinner together, make friends from all grades, do homework and go downtown together," says Ana Maria. She also likes cross-country running in the neighbourhood and hanging out with her sister Majo, who is in Grade 11.


Ana Maria, who is from Mexico City, says that attending BSS has created many



opportunities for her. "BSS has helped to open more pathways for university and career choices that I may not have had in Mexico." She adds that it's been fun meeting people from all over the world. "I've made friends with boarders from Vietnam, the United States, Germany, Jamaica, Bahamas, and China," she says.

Though Ana Maria has always loved math, she is planning her career around a subject she began learning about recently: "I want to study economics. I'm interested in policy-making in the future in Mexico." She says that BSS has given her the confidence to apply to universities in the United States and the UK, as well as Canada.

Area of Greatest Need



ESSENTIAL AND IMMEDIATE FUNDING. As BSS girls develop their resilience, confidence and independence, they are encouraged to ask questions, discover new perspectives and embrace challenges. Funding for the Area of Greatest Need allows the Head of School to support students' individual needs and interests as they take ownership of their education. These essential funds immediately supplement learning resources, emerging opportunities and technologies across the school.



Donors make a positive impact for every student

Students learn deeply when they can explore their own interests, and develop skills and goals that are meaningful to them as individuals. Funding through the Area of Greatest Need supports experiences, facilities, tools and resources that define the supportive, student-centered learning environment at BSS – as students learn powerfully on campus and remotely.

Last year, donations to this fund allowed the school to immediately address a variety of students' interests and needs for wellbeing, including new basketball uniforms for teams from all divisions, sweatshirts for the Senior School robotics team and push-button door operators to improve campus accessibility in five high-priority areas across the school. This fund also purchased adjustable ergonomic furniture to improve classroom accessibility for students with individual needs, portable art kits for Junior School students, storage to protect instruments for our younger students' curricular and extracurricular learning, and new theatre technologies for performing arts classes and productions. The Area of Greatest Need also funded workshops that foster leadership and community-building skills for Middle and Senior School boarding students who represent BSS across Canada and around the world.

Giving with gratitude

Arriving at BSS for her first parent-teacher conference, Rachel Hu had trouble finding the classroom where the meeting would be held. Instead of just pointing the way, Head of School Dr. Terpstra walked her there. This is the kind of personal gesture that Hu has experienced repeatedly since enrolling her daughter Alice in Grade 3. "Starting from our first school visits, we found warmth from all of the staff and teachers. They were very welcoming, like a big family," says Hu.

Having relocated from Beijing, China, to Canada, Hu and her husband Haiming Wei, are also grateful that their daughter feels comfortable at BSS. Alice loves a variety of subjects, including math, science, integrated research, art and drama. She is on the school swim team and was selected to join the Toronto Swim Club. But even more exciting, says Hu, are the changes she's seen in her daughter's attitude. "She's developed a great curiosity, and whereas in the past she was really worried about success or failure, she now looks at experiences as a way of achieving growth," says Hu.

Hu and Wei were motivated to give to BSS after receiving a letter from the school translated into Mandarin that reassured



parents that even if they were experiencing financial difficulty, no child would be left behind during the COVID-19 pandemic. "To me, that was a very touching message, and since I was capable of giving, I felt empowered to do so," says Hu. The family made a significant donation to the Area of Greatest Need to help the school address emerging learning needs as they arise.

Giving is also deeply rooted in Hu's family and beliefs. "There is a saying in Chinese culture: that one can 'accumulate good fortune through helping others,' either through financial donations or gifts of time."

Grade 8 teacher, Tim Somerville, knows it's the little moments that count in – and beyond – the classroom. In the "new normal" of the pandemic, he's missed the transitions before and after class, when a student says something memorable or another needs a word of encouragement. He marvels at how strongly those interactions, and classroom experiences, resonate. "I'm always shocked when I run into a student, even two or three years later, in the hall and they tell me something I said in class that stuck with them, both praise and feedback," he says.

A BSS teacher for 11 years and a donor for eight of those years, Somerville gives because it makes him feel even more a part of the BSS team. "For me, it demonstrates I'm fully on board with the mission of BSS. We provide these amazing opportunities to students who come from a greater and greater variety of backgrounds, and I'm proud that they go on to become powerful people after they leave our school."

Somerville donates to the Area of Greatest Need because he knows he isn't always aware of issues behind the scenes. His gift shows his trust in the school's leadership. As soon as their big sister Sienna came to BSS for Grade 8, Samantha and Olivia wanted to attend as well. This year, the new Grade 6 sisters' dream has come true. Sienna inspired her younger sisters through her involvement last year, when she joined the basketball team, performed in the BSS/UCC musical theatre production and sang in the choir. "One thing that Sienna loves about BSS is the opportunity to do so many different things," says her father Tim Baron. Now, Samantha and Olivia are eager to get involved in extracurriculars and other opportunities too.

Tamara Baron, the girls' mother, says she appreciates the BSS mission to create well-rounded students. "I love the power of 'girls can do anything' and I want them to be strong and not afraid to try new things." She also loves the number of volunteer opportunities that are available to her daughters.

Joining the BSS community, the Barons were eager to contribute. They both enjoyed Deck the Hall, an annual event organized by the Parent Association to build community and support fundraising needs at the school. Tamara also started volunteering with the General Store. "I loved it," she says. "You meet so many parents and everybody



is so welcoming."

The Barons' experiences at BSS inspired them to contribute financially in support of Academic and Program Enrichment. Masterclasses elevate music curriculum

Among other impacts, Academic and Program Enrichment funding brings music classes to life. Through this fund, BSS faculty have supported Junior, Middle and Senior School students in identifying disciplines and instruments to explore with multidisciplinary specialists.

Last year, faculty arranged for performer, teacher and academic, Dr. Izabella Budai, to facilitate flute sectionals and an ensemble with students in Grades 6, 7 and 8. Senior vocal classes welcomed Dr. Hilary Apfelstadt from the University of Toronto for conducting and performance masterclasses. David Lane from Canada's premiere vocal ensemble, Cadence, also joined the BSS a cappella group for a vocal percussion and beat-boxing workshop.

Ask Cynthia CHENG Mintz '98 about her most memorable experience at BSS and she will tell you it is her teachers' passion for education that stays with her, especially French teacher Mme. Green and Math teacher Ms. Layard. She also remembers the many curricular and extracurriculars she loved, particularly singing in choirs, and the breadth and depth of academic subjects available to her. Inspired by subjects she explored at BSS, Cheng Mintz studied Drama and History at Queen's and earned a Master's degree in the History of Education from the University of Toronto. She has worked in public relations and has been a blogger for many years, creating a lifestyle blog magazine for women in their 20s and 30s. In addition to parenting an active two-year-old, she now works as a philanthropy advisor to families and co-hosts a podcast about living with invisible disabilities on YouTube.

Cheng Mintz started giving back to the school as a young Old Girl, making her first gift to the Annual Fund in 2004. Her philanthropic commitment to the school is steadfast and continues to grow. She has



supported the school's fundraising priorities for 15 consecutive years, and is motivated by the variety of support our funding priorities bring to students. Cheng Mintz recognizes the importance of innovative, accessible education and, over the years, has supported Financial Assistance. She currently directs her annual gift towards Academic and Program Enrichment and hopes that especially in the challenging time of the pandemic, such support will help to sustain programs that might otherwise be more fragile. Students honour the history of our land

Indigenous Guide Alan Colley enriches students' curricular and extracurricular experiences through his knowledge, thanks to programming funded through Academic and Program Enrichment. Applying principles of inquiry-based learning with diversity, equity and inclusion, Colley helps students view their studies in ecology, arts and social sciences through an Indigenous lens. Grade 4 students participated in year-long investigative research sessions with him in the Cedarvale Ravine, cultivating a reciprocal and compassionate relationship with the land BSS occupies. Colley also taught Indigenous ways of thinking, including concepts of grounding and greeting, to Grade 10 students in preparation for their exchange to Melbourne Girls Grammar School and visit to Koorie Heritage Trust in Melbourne, Australia.

Building a legacy by giving back

Like many new parents, welcoming her first child inspired a moment of pause for Becca MINTZ '05 and her husband. "You start thinking about your legacy, and what you want to leave behind," says Mintz. In addition to her annual donations to school priorities, she wanted to memorialize her support through a planned gift directed to Financial Assistance.

"The Financial Assistance program means that talented young women who otherwise would not be able to attend BSS are able to enrol. Supporting that through Planned Giving means that I can contribute to someone else's strong foundation, and that is a privilege," she says. Mintz and her husband also chose to give to the hospitals that helped save their baby's life after he was born prematurely. "We were thinking more systematically about charitable giving rather than just making donations here and there," says Mintz.

During her time at BSS, Mintz was highly involved on the basketball and softball teams, and as a prefect in her final year. It was years later that she recognized how organizing school-wide events had given her a leg up as a leader. "My peers in first-year university were struggling to put on a fundraiser and I'd already done that a million times at BSS. I felt really prepared, not just academically but with life savvy." Earning a business degree from McGill University, Mintz joined Capital One after graduation and is now a senior director on



their analytics team.

Mintz continues to connect with BSS as an Old Girl. She was a member of the BSS Alumnae Association Executive, including serving two years as co-chair. During that time, she collaborated with others to start a Young Alumnae Committee.

Mintz says volunteering helped widen her BSS network even further and has deepened her appreciation for the school. "Anyone who has benefitted from a BSS education can speak to how well-positioned they were for the next chapter of their life," she says. "If we can contribute to someone else having that experience, who might not have the socio-economic background to attend, that's pretty incredible."

Though the COVID-19 pandemic has affected the lives and routines of everyone in profound ways, the BSS community has proven its compassion and willingness to help, no matter the circumstance. When the call for personal protective equipment (PPE) donations was made in early Spring, members of the BSS community played a valuable role in supporting front-line healthcare workers.

In April, two dozen BSS families arranged for a shipment of 276 N95 masks and 1,300 surgical masks from China to Toronto. Sara Mesgarzadeh, Director of Facilities Operations, delivered these to Sunnybrook Hospital. The families' generosity did not stop there, as they also made a monetary contribution to the hospital on behalf of BSS.

In late August, as preparations were underway for the reopening of school in September, two families offered their support to help ensure a safe and optimal learning experience at BSS. David Klass, father of Grade 2 student Elle, donated 1,000 face shields for all BSS faculty and staff. These face shields, adorned with a splash of purple and fun hashtags, made them more welcoming to students. Klass explains that he felt it was his duty to offer help where he could. "We have the ability and capacity to make an impact and that is what drove us to make the donation to BSS," says Klass.

BSS parents Aline and Raffi Nalbandian, and Maral and Ara Nalbandian felt a similar motivation to help safety measures on campus this year. They donated approximately 1,000 bottles of hand sanitizers produced by their own company to be distributed to all BSS students for their personal use.




